

Scott Graupner's two builds:


Hobby Boss King Tiger, Scott said tracks were a real pain to clean up, but they did come out looking good.



DML panzer IV with Ryefield Indy link tracks.



Chuck's in-progress 1/350 scale TAKOM Berliner Zoo Flak Tower. The kit was lacking the steel shutters over the windows, so they were fabricated from .010 evergreen sheet styrene..all 144 of them.



Detail view of one of the 128mm twin guns on the tower roof. Paint used was an acetone solvent paint called tru-color. Extremely thick paint, required massive thinning and high pressure to spray. Never again..



Joel's 1/72 scale conversion of a T-34 to some kind of APC or recon vehicle, Egyptian maybe





Victor found a mold making material on AMAZON called Oyumaru and is experimenting with it. It's a material that you soften in not quite boiling water and press a master into it to form a mold once cool. It cannot be used with resin due to resins curing temps, but works fine with putties or dental plaster. Seems to make decent castings of certain items.



He also found a place 3D printing nice looking tracks for reasonable prices (I think he said something like 10 bucks a set)
