
# 48th ANNUAL MMSI CHICAGO SHOW














Takom released a 1/35 kit of the M29 Weasel. At first it received some bad reviews as "unbuildable", However I've included a build article that details problem areas and fixes for them, and really demonstrates that the criticism is unwarranted.

I wrapped up my Takom 1/35 M29 Weasel this weekend. I need to add the windshield wipers and a few small things. It's straight out-of-the-box. It's a very nice kit with very delicate details. However, I suspect that many of these kits will end up on modelers' "Shelf-of-Doom" due to the aggravating suspension. Unlike the rest of the kit, it is badly designed and poorly fitting that makes it a nightmare to assemble.




## Takom 1/35 Studebaker M29 Weasel

Rol Domantay Advanced Modelers and Techniques

Takom 1/35 Studebaker M29 Weasel... There is a YouTube build review that absolutely bashes this kit as being almost unbuildable, plastic doesn't take glue, nothing fits, huge gaps and ill fitting parts... He scared a lot of modelers away from this kit, judging by the comments... Don't go by that review, I watched the whole thing and it seemed to me that it was clumsily assembled with no thought on test fitting, cleaning of parts etc... This kit is definitely not for the faint of heart and the modeler must have advanced skills and patience to get it right... My first tip is "Do not follow the instructions step by step concerning the build of the hull and related pieces... If you do you will end up having the same bad results as that YouTube build review... I will be ordering another M29 that I will turn into a civilian version in a duck hunting setting...

1 Once the 3pc floorboard (step 5) is assembled proceed to (step 6) radiator, assemble the instrument panel fully but do not attach engine cover (ptC5) as shown in the instructions... Attach radiator assembly, center bulkhead(step 7) and part C14... Attaching these pieces will help align the main tub... Test fit all before committing to glue... Assemble the tub, use the floorboard to line everything up... I used tape to hold everthing in place while I lined everything up before glue, I started by glueing the corners first and worked my way front to back checking square and fit the whole time... When everything was dry I put a light bead of super glue on all the mating joints... This assembly needs to be strong...






2 Assemble the tub, use the floorboard to line everything up... I used tape to hold everthing in place while I lined everything up before glue, I started by glueing the corners first and worked my way front to back checking square and fit the whole time... 3As a result the tub is square, level and tight with minimal seams... some light sanding needs to be done on the location points for parts C7, C8, C10, these pieces need to be at a right angle to the side panels... There will still be room to add some PE at a later time...




4 There are some small parts that are attached to the bulkhead, I'm skipping the steps (for now) that attaches the control arms/levers... I will attach later...



5Attach part E46 to the panel, not the radiator frame... This will also help in alignment of certain panels...




6 Back view of instrument panel with part E46 attached...



7 Rear view... Square, solid, and tight with minimal seams... all other parts for this area can be attached later...

8 Front view...



9 Attach instrument panel, test fit this area, it's a bit finicky... I reinforced the back of this where it glues to the floor with styrene rod and CA glue...



10 Part E46 should mate tightly to the Radiator panels, glue this area well...



11 It should look like this... level and square... not glued yet where it meets the top panel... to make body assembly removable...

12 Top view... top section is removable for now, but it all fits nice, no gaps...it easily slides onto the floor with a little tweaking...





13 Top view... nice and square...




14 Engine cover, perfect fit... will be glued later...
YouTube build review had a huge gap on the side wall
area... Reviewer hid the hideous gap with a sculpted
tarp and tons of filler...



15 Top section removable so as to complete the build... drivers seat, control levers, photo etch etc... I'm also checking to see if I can modify the windscreen so it's in the folded down position, might not be possible, we'll see...



**A** Tracks went together easily... Attention must be paid to the assembly sequence and direction...



B The small sections of track have a curve that wrap around the drive wheel/sprocket ... Care must be taken lining up the track to the toothed drive sprocket... Bogie/idler wheels are glued to the track...]

C Floorboard is permanently mated to the main hull





D Right side



E Tub is not permanent yet, etch and small details first...



F Sam at the controls...



G I Rear view, will need some gear in there










